#### WORK ON THE LOWLAND TRAIL

The Adirondack Mountain Club Professional Trail Crew, living on site, began a five day work week on June 11th to build bridges and reconstruct sections of the Lowland trail. This loop extends northeast from the boardwalk to extensive views of the wetlands on a wide point. Five crew members carried in wood and began setting and nailing bridges as the Conservation Field Days students finished their programs. The work was funded by a bequest from former board member Herb Mason. Future work may include a volunteer crew in the summer of 2011.

#### WILD FRUITS AND WILDLIFE

The early and mid-summer wild fruits and berries provide sweet, nourishing food for mammals and birds. Some of the late summer/fall fruits, especially the more pungent, sour, even toxic varieties may be distasteful to some, yet are extremely important in the diet of the long-distance migrant birds. Find out why as we look at some wild fruiting plants and discuss their value to the Nature Center's wildlife. Preregistration requested.

#### **MUSHROOMS OR MOSSES - DEPENDS**

If we have wet weather we should find sufficient fungi to learn how to identify some of the common mushrooms. To collect fungi we need waxed paper, a field knife, and some sort of basket. If the weather is drier we will learn how to recognize the common mosses. To collect mosses we need a hand lens, 8.5 x 11 sheets of paper, and preferably, a small spray mister (such as you would use in ironing clothes).
